Fair management reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgment may determine.
Entries made under a fictitious or assumed name will be ineligible for any premium.
No judge will be allowed to exhibit in any department in which he or she is employed as a judge.
No employee of the Allentown Fair will be eligible for any premium in any department in which he or she is employed.
Exhibits, if mailed or shipped, must be sent prepaid to: Allentown Fair, 302 N. 17th St., Allentown, PA 18104.

Members of the Society and their children under age 19 may enter articles free of charge, except in Departments 2, 3, 4, 5, 6.

ALL REGISTRATIONS MUST BE MADE BY MAIL OR AT THE REGISTRATION OFFICE IN AGRI~PLEX.
Exhibitors in Depts. 8, 12, 13, 14, 15, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 23 who are not members of the Society will be required to pay a registration fee of $\$ 10$ in return for which the exhibitor will receive a receipt for 5 gate admission passes to the Fair. This receipt will be exchanged for the gate passes after the articles have been presented for exhibition to the attendants of the departments and the receipt has been stamped.
No registration fees will be refunded after registrations are made.
